MAIN SPEAKERS: John Steele was raised on a 2000 ewe farm in England and Eadie Steele was raised on a mixed livestock farm in Ontario. The Steele's now operate 2000 maternal composite ewes along with some select terminal sire composites on 700 acres near Norwood, Ontario. Their farming operation is a combination of technologies and production system from around the world, adopted to suit Ontario conditions and markets. The Steele's have won many awards for their farming methods, but they consider their greatest achievement to be their children Ian (age 26) and Chelsea (age 24).

Jordan Moody hails from Big Timber, Montana as a 7th generation shepherd. Jordan's family has run as many as 12,000 ewes on public lands in Big Sky country with the ranching operation needing to adapt to deal with pressures facing all Western USA sheep operations. Jordan is currently seeking her Master's Degree in Animal Science at MSU working on the interaction of nutrition and reproduction in sheep under the direction of Dr. Richard Ehrhardt.
